Voting

A Congressman, near the time of Prohibition, was asked his attitude toward whiskey. Not knowing the viewpoint of the inquirer, he stated that he was a person of unshakable principle and he would be very pleased to share his position toward whiskey. He replied, "If you mean the demon drink that poisons the mind, pollutes the body, desecrates family life, and inflames sinners, then I'm against it. But if you mean the elixir of Christmas cheer, the shield against winter chill, the taxable potion that puts needed funds into public coffers to comfort little crippled children, then I'm for it. This is my position, and I will not compromise." Asked about a particular issue, comedian Groucho Marx once stated, "Those are my principles and if you don't like them... well, I have others."

Everyone has basic principles that govern direction and purpose. But, like Groucho's wry quip, they may be ever changing like a broken compass that never seems able to lock onto "North".

As Christians, we seek to be guided by biblical principles that have stood the test of time. During this election season, while the church never endorses candidates, it is a constitutional right to comment on issues. The West Ohio Conference of The United Methodist Church urges the following principled votes on issues 5 and 6: **YES on 5 and NO on 6.**

Issue 5 amounts to usury which biblical teaching has long condemned. So-called payday lending can entrap a person into

391% annual percentage rates for a loan thus ensnaring persons for years because they never can climb out of the financial hole prepared by "the system". Voting YES on Issue 5 reaffirms a 28% interest rate cap approved by the legislature earlier this year. We are all aware that sometimes issues are worded in confusing ways on ballots. **Vote YES on Issue 5 to ban the social scourge of incredibly enslaving interest rates.**

Issue 6 raises once more the ugly specter of casino gambling in our State. Proponents claim this will benefit Ohio, but a realistic look at what gambling has done in other places unmasks it for what it truly is: a social disease that ruins many lives, causes social service costs that far outweigh any temporary financial gains, and draws undesirable practices like flies to road kill. **Persons of principled conscience are urged to vote NO on Issue Six.**

Besides voting on Election Day, we have the opportunity to cast another highly important vote by electing to support Trinity Church with a generous pledge for 2009. The economy is weak at present but as God has blessed us with many positive benefits, we are urged to sacrificially support God's Church with our time, talents, and treasure. **Amazing Grace Sunday is Nov. 16 at Trinity, a day we will celebrate completion of the North Wing renovation project.** I ask you to join me in making a pledge to the Church for 2009 on or before that day so the many ministries of Christ through Trinity Church may continue unabated.

Your part counts. You are important. Your influence is significant. Don't forget to vote!

From Macedonia to Columbus: The Choice Is Still Yours

"And now brothers, we want you to know about the Grace that God has given the Macedonian churches. Out of the most severe trial, their overflowing joy and their extreme poverty, welled up in rich generosity. For I testify that they gave as much as they were able, and even beyond their ability. Entirely on their own they urgently pleaded with us for the privilege of sharing in this service to the saints. (2 Corinthians 8:1-4)

If you are like me, in the past few weeks you hesitated to turn on the TV or open a newspaper, or go online. Everywhere we went there was bad news. Bailouts that may or may not happen, and which may or may not work. We have seen established banks fold. Stocks plummet and then rise and then drop again. Homes all around us are foreclosing. It seems as if all the things we used to depend on have suddenly collapsed.

We long for normalcy. We long for dependability. We long for consistency. But maybe, just maybe we are hungering for something more. Dr. Dennis Kinlaw, former President of Asbury College, once said that within each human being there is a hunger for the eternal. Because we have been made by the eternal one, and have His image within us, we hunger for the things of eternity. And given the chance we will hold onto that which is eternal regardless of the shifting sands all around us.

The church in Macedonia must have had this hunger. In Our Scripture Paul marvels that even though times were hard for them and they were poor, their joy welled up in rich generosity. They gave beyond their ability. It seems that because of their financial difficulties, Paul was willing to let them off the hook, but they pleaded with him not to take away the great privilege of giving.

Given the choice between taking what they had and giving it to a changing world or investing it in something that had eternal significance, the church chose the eternal. They were bale to not only give but also have a generosity that welled up within them because their giving was not dependent on what they had in the bank, or on the day's economic news. It was based on the one who sits eternal on the throne of God. When others were in need the church stood in the gap not only gave, but also were thankful for the privileged.

The people in Macedonia are not so different than you and me. I have told the leaders of the Loyalty campaign that I believe this will be the most successful campaign Trinity church has ever had. Because I believe that you too have a hunger for the eternal. I believe you want to take the blessing God has given you and use them for something of eternal significance. This year our giving will not depend on what we have, or where the stock market is. We are the children of the eternal God. Our actions are based on the love and passion we have for Him and the call He places on our lives. Even though we are in tough times I believe that we will well up in rich generosity. I believe that we will take great joy in the great privilege of taking what we have and using it to further the Kingdom of God.

Trinity has been a leader in the support of the Bethlehem on Broad Ministry at the Broad Street United Methodist church since a special member of our church got us all involved in 2000. Mike Johnson was a member of Trinity and the Life Builder group when he started Trinity's support for the ministry, while he was battling terminal cancer. Mike passed away in August of 2001, but his legacy lives on through this very special ministry for Trinity, the Broad Street United Methodist Church and the people served through this outreach. If you have participated in years past, you know how special this event is ... if you haven't had the opportunity, we invite you to join in!

The Bethlehem on Broad Street Ministry has been serving Columbus area families in need for over 15 years during the Christmas holiday season. Trinity, in fellowship with numerous other area churches, again is joining together with a goal of gathering and packing 1,200 food boxes to be distributed at Broad Street United Methodist Church on Saturday, December 20. As part of this mission, we will also continue to support Bethlehem's transitional housing project, The Inn on Broad Street.

Trinity UMC's goal is to provide 500 (over 40% of the total) of these food boxes (affectionately known as "BoB Boxes") through the generous financial and service support from our members.

There are many ways to get involved! Buy a whole, partial or just a little bit of a BoB Box! (\$60 for whole BoB Box, \$30 for a half, or any portion you would like.)

A full BoB Box donation will provide food for a family for four days. It will also help provide for part of one night's stay at The Inn on Broad Street. Now through December 7th, donations can be made at the Bethlehem Project tables outside both the traditional and contemporary services, placed in the offering plate or mailed to the church office.
