## A New Leaf

Starting again often is termed "turning over a new leaf," conjuring the image of turning to a new page and trying for a new beginning.

An intriguing item for sale at most bookstores is a book with blank pages. In such a volume you become the author, writing whatever you will. Often such blank books are used for journaling to keep a diary of thoughts, feelings, and events. The book is filled with potential and unknown adventures - whatever the coming year holds.

A new year is like beginning a journey into terra incognita, uncharted territory where no one knows what will occur. We may think we know; we may have a firm idea of what will happen; but no one can say with certainty what the coming twelve months will bring. One year ago no one foresaw our current economic turmoil or the possible bankruptcy of a business so large and respected as General Motors. The election would be between "Rudy and Hillary" with everyone else watching from the sidelines.

Certainly uncertainty is a constant of life. However, in spite of this reality, Christians do not succumb to fatalism because of our assurance of God's Presence imparting purpose and joy. One of the great hymns of faith was written by Rev. Thomas Chisholm who had to retire early in life from the Methodist ministry due to failing health. And yet this man who endured

so much wrote one of the greatest hymns: "Great is Thy faithfulness! Morning by morning new mercies I see; all I have needed thy hand hath provided; great is thy faithfulness, Lord, unto me!"

So much fluff is written under the guise of religion it is no wonder many people turn away. But those with a clear understanding of life's anomalies realize that in the midst of whatever comes along, God gives strength and purpose to carry on. There exists a liturgy named the "Wesley Covenant Service" often used at the start of a new year. Just before the sacrament of Holy Communion, the congregation prays this prayer of devotion to God. It is one of the most beautiful and profound prayers in The Book of Worship. At the beginning of 2009, allow this prayer to guide you in turning over a new leaf for a new year, living a life of meaning, purpose, and joy in the Lord.

*O God, I am no longer my own, but thine. Put me to what thou wilt, rank me with whom thou wilt; put me to doing, put me to suffering; let me be employed for thee or laid aside for thee, exalted for thee or brought low for thee; let me be full, let me be empty; let me have all things, let me have nothing; I freely and heartily yield all things to thy pleasure and disposal.*

*And now, O glorious and blessed God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, thou art mine, and I am thine. So be it. And the covenant which I have made on earth, let it be ratified in heaven. Amen.*

"Two thousand nine? How can it possibly be 2009?!"

It was actually more of a jolt than a nudge, that recognition of what year this new year was about to be. I'm not one for New Year's resolutions, but one thought that I find myself continuing to cognize involves barriers, closed doors, mis-understandings, those people whom we invite into our lives and those we choose not to invite. Sometimes we fear to invite them, and sometimes there are those of whom we are just plain unaware. For some reason, sinners, the poor and the forgotten occupy a fair number of my daydreams, and I wonder why. "Guilt?" I ask myself. "Need for some kind of a New Year's resolution?!"

As we enter the Winter season that arrives with nature's exquisite beauty but also with the devastation that same nature sometimes heaps upon us, I am reminded of our ancestors who often saw that devastation as coming from an angry God in return for some disobedience. Well, that's one way to gain the attention of folks: blame "acts of God" on the disobedience of His people! "Does my guilt come from a sense of blame? From a sense that my God sends me jolts, nudges, and also blame?" I ruminated a bit in my younger years.

"No, our God is a God of love" I more often find myself thinking today, and I think of Jesus, much of whose time was spent in the company of the marginalized, the victims, the victimizers, the unlovable. Though this concept seemed to have been more difficult for some of our ancestors, it's one that's so very easy to impart to kids. When they mis-behave, act in hurtful ways to one another, we can remind them of God's love for them. "God loves you so deeply, and He made you to be like Him, loving and kind and good to your friends." When such words are spoken, it doesn't take long before this understanding sinks in. Hurts turn into help, and bullying turns into caring acts from the youngest among us.

"So why is this so much more difficult for us as adults?" I wonder. I cherish the question, and this question's inspiration comes accompanied with a prayer. How I prefer a prayer to a New Year's resolution. "Help us all, dear God, to learn from our children who come to us so very recently from your loving arms to ours."

## Trinity Members Come Through in Supporting the Bethlehem on Broad Ministry

Once again, the Bethlehem on Broad Street ministry relied on Trinity UMC to lead this year's holiday food box drive. This year was a juxtaposition of the difficult financial times and the knowledge that the need was greater than any previous year. Through the generous outpouring of support from our congregation, Trinity once again met its goal to provide 500 food boxes (a.k.a. "BoB Boxes") and financial support for the Inn on Broad Street, a transitional housing mission operated by Broad Street United Methodist Church.

In addition to financial support, many volunteers came through to make the project a success.

Over 100 Trinity members and friends helped pack food boxes on Friday, December 12th. The following day, over 50 helped load and deliver the boxes to Broad Street UMC. Lastly, over 35 volunteered on December 20th to distribute food boxes along
