When novelist Mark Twain was asked what his New Year's resolution would be, he replied, "I'm going to live within my income

this year even if I have to borrow money to do it!"

A man said he had started a diet on January 1. He continued, "In less than a week I lost three pounds - and the will to live!"

Old movies used to depict people at parties hoisting a glass for a toast and uttering "Cheers!" It was a wish for a cheerful life.

In the New Testament (KJV translation) there are seven places where we find the phrase, "Be of good cheer" spoken either by Jesus or the Apostle Paul. The most important of these are from Jesus Christ Himself. As we embark upon 2010 let's carry with us Jesus' "be of good cheer" statements. His words are encouraging and empowering.

"Be of good cheer", Jesus said to a man in Matthew 9:2, "your sins are forgiven you." How wonderful to experience the cleansing and freedom from guilt that so weighs down multitudes of people, unable to forgive their past. But let us hear Jesus' words that bring cheer: "Your sins are forgiven you!" As we confess and believe in Jesus' sacrifice on our behalf, the blessings of that gift are given to us by God.

By His death and resurrection, life was given new meaning and possibility. As we pass through the hours and days of 2010, let us carry with us these promises from Christ that our sins are forgiven, that we need not be afraid, and that all this is possible because Christ has indeed overcome the world. In the end, we will be OK.

That's reason enough to cause even a teetotaler like me to lift a glass of diet cola and wish you "Cheers!" for a wonderful New Year.

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Trinity supports successful Bethlehem on Broad Mission

Members of Trinity's congregation have realized this in their support of the Bethlehem on Broad ministry. Bethlehem on Broad, also known as "BoB," is an annual project by Trinity to build 500 food boxes for needy families of Columbus, and to offer financial support for the Inn at Broad Street – a transitional housing mission operated by Broad Street United Methodist Church.

Sore muscles, nicks and cuts from moving boxes of food and enduring cold weather were very small sacrifices for Trinity volunteers who helped with BoB compared to the challenges

faced by the families served through Bethlehem on Broad. More than 200 Trinity volunteers donated their time and energy to ensure that BoB boxes were built with care and distributed to the families.

Trinity continued its generous support of BoB, which began in 2000 when Trinity member Mike Johnson started this initiative by putting together 25 food boxes out of his garage. Since then the ministry has grown. Trinity's commitment of 500 food boxes is combined with more than a dozen other area churches that contribute enough boxes to generate more than 1,200 total BoB boxes for distribution.

Betty Creagan



We kick off our 2010 Steward of the Month with a salute to another true steward of Trinity, Betty Creagan. Betty is one of those people who keeps Trinity a going entity and a functioning church. She does a lot of the little Sunday to Sunday necessities. Those little things that we generally don't even notice, but would be glaring, if absent. A lifelong Columbus resident, Betty grew up attending Linworth United Methodist (where Rev. Brooks' wife has served). Time and circumstance led her twin sister,

Barbara Coombs, to Trinity during Gene Frazer's tenure, and Betty soon followed.

Currently, Betty gives her time by serving on three committees: Worship, Finance, and Administrative Council. But time spent serving on the committees is but a fraction of her commitment to Trinity. Any Saturday prior to a communion Sunday, come over to Trinity bright and early and you'll find Betty there filling the cups with juice and preparing the plates with bread. She also makes sure the pastor has a loaf to break. It's a job for which she's had years of preparation. As a youth, she helped her mother prepare for communion at Linworth, when they baked the bread at home. And, of course, setting up is only half the job. Betty stays after communion services to clean up and get ready for next time.

You, dear reader, may I safely assume are a pledging member of Trinity? And if not, tsk tsk, why not? Come on! Get on board with your fellow believers and get your own personalized envelopes. Betty would certainly applaud you and would like to remind you to use your pledge envelopes. It would make Betty's, and her Sunday blessed bevy of counters', jobs easier. For Betty organizes the counting and accounting of our Sunday offering. Each Sunday she sees to it that we have two counters for the money and a third official to finalize the count. The fun begins at 10 a.m. and doesn't end until the books are balanced and each of you regular contributors get credit on your account. Turns out it's a lot easier to get all the accounting done in a timely fashion if your gifts come in your personalized envelope (or, as Betty suggests, if you don't have your envelope, help them out and put your envelope number on your check).

Not content just to donate her time, Betty also gives of her talent with the Prayers & Squares group that makes quilts. Betty and about a dozen other women are currently working to produce 40 quilts for Trinity to send with members of our Mexico orphanage mission trip. They hope to have 25 ready to go with the February group and the next 15 to go with the March group. Generally, Prayers & Squares quilts are made as gifts and symbols of our prayers for ailing members of our Trinity family.

In her spare time Betty cleans the offering plates, creates new designs for and has made new communion linens, as well as serves on the Altar Guild. Altar Guild makes the arrangements to have flowers in the sanctuary, meditation room, and chapel.

Betty's contributions to Trinity are all around us, from the simple beauty of the new linens and quilts, to the polished shine on our offering plates and/or the quarterly contribution statements. In many ways these are the things we take for granted or don't even stop to think about (e.g., how much dedicated effort does it take to fill all those little juice glasses?), but going to church wouldn't be going to church without them. A steward is one who manages the affairs and finances of a household. We at Trinity are blessed to have so many good stewards like Betty who keep our Trinity house a good church home for us and for our Lord.

Strategic Planning Goals Adopted

The Strategic Planning Executive Committee of the Administrative Council was charged to identify a set of priorities for the improvement, expansion, and further development of Trinity's mission and ministry. To assist in accomplishing this task, the Strategic Planning Executive Committee sent on May 28, 2009 a survey to the chairs of Trinity's 16 councils and committees, 24 elected At-Large members of the Administrative Council, five church officers and leaders, and six ministers and program staff members.

Using the responses to the survey as a resource, the Strategic Planning Executive Committee drafted a series of priorities, objectives, and goals organized by four major themes:

- Discipleship/Mission/Education
- Hospitality/Fellowship
- Financial Growth and Stability
- Planning and Evaluation

The priorities were revised and submitted to the Administrative Council on November 10, 2009. The Administrative Council accepted the report and passed unanimously the motion that the goals document be presented to the congregation on November 19, 2009 during the Annual Church Conference, where it was adopted as the goals to improve, expand, and further develop the mission and ministry of Trinity United Methodist Church during the next three to five years.
