One Down and One to Go! *by Reverend Philip Brooks*

"Here we go again," might be a thought in many minds when the last Sunday of May arrives because the week before begins Phase Two of the capital renovation project on the North

Wing of Trinity Church. Phase One concluded the day before Easter allowing access for the first time in 12 weeks to our beautiful sanctuary, appropriately first used on Easter morning!

For approximately five months, all three levels of the North Wing will be unavailable for normal use while complete renovations occur including air conditioning, new floors and walls, everything! It's an exciting prospect to know that by sometime in October all should be completed and the new, beautiful, updated renovations will be successfully finished. The Building Committee and Trustees deserve high praise for their leadership as does every person who contributed to the "Faith in the Future" capital campaign.

Anyone familiar with the floor plan of Trinity Church immediately recognizes that without Fellowship Hall and the North Wing class rooms, we face challenges in continuing our ongoing ministries. But continue we must although there will be some readjusting of meeting places for various groups and events. All of this will be temporary but necessary until Phase Two ends.

After discussion and prayer, a plan was reached for how to handle the Sunday morning schedule without changing times. It affects the 11:00 hour due to Traditional Worship and Crossroads Contemporary Worship occurring

simultaneously but in different sections of the church building. Following is the plan we will follow.

This motion was presented by the Worship Committee and the Crossroads Council to the April 8, 2008, Trinity Administrative Council (and passed unanimously):

Whereas the North Wing of Trinity United Methodist Church (including Fellowship Hall) will be unavailable for use during building renovations from May 19 through mid-October 2008, and

Whereas we wish to continue the worship opportunities presently available for our congregation on Sunday mornings, We therefore move the following Sunday morning schedule to be in effect during renovations:

9 a.m. - Traditional Worship in the Sanctuary

10 a.m. - Christian Education Hour in various available classrooms

**11 a.m. - Crossroads Contemporary Worship in the Sanctuary - AND --
11 a.m. - Traditional Worship in the Chapel**

After study, discussion, and prayer, we believe the above schedule to be the best option available to allow Trinity to continue to minister and grow in the midst of building renovations.

Immediately upon completion of the North Wing renovations when Fellowship Hall is again available, the 11 a.m. hour will revert to the normal schedule of Traditional Worship in the Sanctuary and Crossroads Contemporary Worship in Fellowship Hall.

Free-throw Shooting Contest May 18 Supports **Nothing But Nets**

On Sunday, May 18 Trinity is hosting a Free-Throw Shooting Contest for all ages, men and women, girls and boys. The event will raise money for Nothing But Nets, an exciting mission and service joint endeavor of the National Basketball Association and the United Methodist Church. The mission's goal is to prevent deaths from malaria in Africa. Many countries located in Sub-Saharan Africa lose approximately 1 in 5 children under the age of five to malaria. The disease is easily prevented in significant part by distribution and use of pesticide-treated nets large enough for a family to sleep under. For only \$10, a family can receive a net that will provide four years of protection from the mosquitoes that spread malaria.

The contest goes from 1-3 p.m. with refreshments and registration beginning around 12:30 p.m. Adults of all ages and children, 1st grade and up, will take their shots in Fellowship Hall, which will be equipped with four basketball hoops. Children kindergarten and under will have plastic hoops set up in the Undercroft. Registrants will have three minutes to see how many free throws they can make. The person with the highest number in each age category will win a prize. Registration for children 1st grade through adults is \$10 and \$5 for children kindergarten and under. The \$10 registration fee will buy a pesticide-treated net, its shipping to Africa, and training for its use. In addition to a registration fee, contestants are invited to solicit friends to sponsor them for each basket they make.

Hot dogs, chips, and beverages will be available for a nominal fee starting at 12:30 p.m. in Fellowship Parlor.

Why is Trinity UMC eager to support Nothing But Nets? Our Bishop Bruce Ough collects a "Miracle Offering" each year at Annual Conference (June 8-11) of contributions from all the churches in the West Ohio Conference. This year Bishop Ough wants to raise \$70,000 for the Nothing But Nets campaign. He asks each local church to contribute approximately \$1/member. Our goal is \$2000. Pre-registration and sponsor forms will be available in the narthex, May 4 and 11. If you have questions about the event, please contact Rev. Ogle.

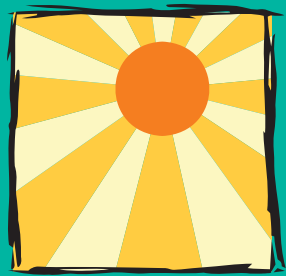

Thanks to many volunteers, the clothing room is clean. We are presently in the process of changing from winter to spring/summer clothes. **Please do not bring winter clothes to New Life until mid-September.** We have nowhere to store them.

In The Message translation of Matthew 25, Jesus says, "...I was shivering and you gave me clothes...". That is exactly what we did in the clothing room this winter. Every winter coat we could get our hands on was given to keep our neighbors warm. (Lesson learned: men's coats size extra large to 3x will be needed next fall). We are particularly grateful for the many new coats purchased this winter. Always, we are grateful for the generous and quality donations we are given.

Each month an average of 50 new people come to be served. In addition we provide clothing for nearly 2000 neighbors each month, thus our resources diminish quickly. It has been most helpful that some churches are providing a given toiletry item each month.

As the demand becomes greater, every donation fulfills our mission to clothe those in need and to follow the command of Jesus, "I'm telling the solemn truth: Whenever you did one of these things to someone overlooked or ignored, that was me-you did it to me." The Message Matthew 25

For the last quarter century, perhaps no Trinity member's acts of stewardship have been witnessed by more people than those of this month's featured performer, Dr. Ruskin "Rusty" Lawyer. Any passing eyes traveling on Cambridge



Boulevard or 5th Avenue, that cast a glance toward our beautiful building, have seen the colors of his passion and labors of love in grooming and maintaining our landscaping. Everyone knows April showers bring May flowers, and at Trinity it's Rusty who makes them bloom. Pictured with Rusty above is his trusty dog Max, who generally accompanies Rusty on his manicuring missions.

The upcoming Memorial Day weekend brings the largest single day effort in the never ending project that is keeping up our facility's face on the world. **Volunteers are asked to gather from 9 to 11 am on the Monday of the holiday weekend to clean up and plant.** Donations have been accepted in advance of that day, given in memory of friends or loved ones, that are used in the purchase of flowers, primarily Geraniums. The altar guild assists in obtaining the flowers and Rusty leads the crew of volunteers in planting and grooming on that Monday morning from 9-11 a.m. Did we mention that 9-11am on Monday of Memorial Day would be a great time to come out and help keep your church looking lovely for all who pass by, be they members, visitors, or ordinary citizens?

While the Memorial Day planting may be the most notable event on Rusty's "ecclesiastical" (eco-lesiatical?) calendar, his work is really all year round. As winter recedes, there is the need to clean the beds and plantings. This needs to be done before Memorial Day so planting the geraniums can proceed unencumbered.
