How Bishops Are Obtained and Assigned

Some persons mistakenly assume that bishops for the United Methodist Church, or any other denomination, somehow descend from heaven and are

then assigned their roles. But that's not how it happens. The process is very deliberative with a large element of "politics" and many ballots of voting representing various viewpoints and agendas.

There are five jurisdictions (multi-State regions) in the United States and once every four years delegates to each of the jurisdictions meet for four days during the same week to elect bishops for their regions. As part of the North Central Jurisdiction there is only one retirement this quadrennium (meaning "four years") so only one bishop will be elected in mid-July. By the time you read this, all will be completed but I'm writing this summary before going to the conference. At present, 12 "candidates" are known for that one position.

For many years I have been a member of the North Central Jurisdiction Committee on Episcopacy (NCJCOE) whose responsibility it is to assign each bishop to an area for the coming quadrennium. The committee is composed of one layperson and one clergy from each of the 12 conferences in the jurisdiction. A bishop presides over an area which may include one or more annual conferences. West Ohio is one of those areas and its two representatives are elected to a four-year term by the West Ohio delegation to the Jurisdictional Conference. Our jurisdiction has 12 conferences and ten areas. (Michigan and Indiana each have

two conferences presided over by one bishop in each State.)

Bishops are assigned for one quadrennium at a time by the 24 persons who comprise the NCJCOE. All deliberations are confidential but the process is not.

The process is lengthy and complex. The committee meets at least annually throughout the four years preceding Jurisdictional Conference for the purpose of interviewing current bishops, hearing their concerns, assessing needs of the areas and bishops, and staying informed regarding trends and issues.

Two years before the next Jurisdictional Conference, an "area profile" is undertaken whereby each area and bishop is evaluated. This is done through random sample interviews of persons in the conference as well as interviews with key persons and groups such as district superintendents and various conference leaders. All this information is compiled by each annual conference committee on episcopacy and then forwarded to the NCJCOE for study.

At Jurisdictional Conference, soon after a person is elected to the episcopacy she or he is interviewed by the NCJCOE to ascertain personal gifts, graces, issues, concerns, and desires regarding that person's coming assignment to an area. The responsibility of the NCJCOE is to match gifts and graces of the bishops to the areas they can serve most effectively.

This is not as easy as it may appear because the "personnel pool" is limited to 10 areas and 10 bishops. These must be matched in an "all things considered" manner that seems best for the areas and the entire jurisdiction. *Continued on p. 3*

“Continually.” That word is among my favorites as I work daily through adult Christian education issues and needs. When I was very young, the thought that one went through school, was then considered educated, ready to meet the world and fully prepared for an adult life, seemed to permeate our thinking. It was rare that we spoke or wrote about the concept that education continues throughout our adult lives. Today, of course, we not only understand this reality, we embrace it. The adult council has worked very hard this year to provide a diverse set of offerings each Sunday school session. In this period of renovation of the North wing, we are able to offer in the Early Fall only two offerings, but in November that number may increase to eight!

During the Early Fall session, September 7 through September 26, we are deeply honored to have Dr Sarah Lancaster, Professor of Theology, at the Methodist Theological Seminary, who will lead a class on “What It Means to Be a Methodist.” Dr. Lancaster’s areas of expertise include Authority of Scripture, Wesleyan/Methodist Studies, and Ecumenics. Her PhD is from Southern Methodist University. How I wish I could share with you Dr. Lancaster’s vast and numerous publications, but suffice it to say that this is your opportunity to receive a solid grounding in Methodist values, our Methodist heritage and on John Wesley himself, quoted below:

“What then is the mark? Who is a Methodist, according to your own account?” I answer: A Methodist is one who has “the love of God set abroad in his heart by the Holy Ghost given unto him;” one who “loves the Lord his God with all his heart, and with all his soul, and with all his mind, and with all his strength. God is the joy of his heart, and the desire of his soul; which is constantly crying out, “Whom have I in heaven but thee? And there is none upon earth that I desire beside thee! My God and my all! Thou art the strength of my heart, and my portion for ever!”

Absolutely no assignment decisions are made until all the bishops have been elected because it is impossible to make assignments until all the players are known. In July 2004 the last bishop was not elected until late Friday night. The assignments had to be announced Saturday morning at the Consecration Service. This sequence of events converged to provide an "all nighter" for the NCJCOE. I've been part of several "all nighters" through the years of my service on the committee.

The last-elected bishop and spouse were interviewed soon after midnight. Then the NCJCOE began a process utilizing all the data which had been studied over previous years supplemented with information about the three newly elected bishops. Using newsprint on the walls, each conference was listed along with its needs and challenges, then each member of the NCJCOE placed the name of the bishop each person felt most closely matched the needs of that area. There followed an extended time of prayer, discussion, and discernment to make the best matches "all things considered" for the jurisdiction.

Once the final decision was reached, representatives went to each bishop's room to share the news of the assignment. At the Saturday morning Consecration Service where newly elected bishops were consecrated, the North Central Jurisdictional Conference voted to accept the committee's recommendations and the bishops were thereby officially assigned for the following four years. The process involved input and prayers from hundreds of persons, the best judgment of the NCJCOE, and an assignment vote by the entire Jurisdictional Conference.

Bishops serve for a four year term, normally renewed once but occasionally renewed twice for a maximum of twelve years. They are burdened with incredible responsibility and deserve our prayers and support. The West Ohio conference contains nearly 1,150 individual congregations presided over by one bishop and eight district superintendents. Our official denominational mission statement is: "The mission of the United Methodist Church is to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world."

Every poorly caulked room of windows, doors and baseboards in your home, apartment, business or church collectively causes the largest waste of your money and the biggest creation of unnecessary greenhouse gases. It is more difficult mentally than physically to get the job done. Just make believe you are living in the Yellow Submarine and there are small leaks of water every where. It becomes much more urgent if you think of all the air leaks as if they were a fluid.
