Someone noted "the average person is crucifying himself between two thieves: the regrets of yesterday and the worries about tomorrow."

In Matthew 6:34, Jesus teaches us to take things one day at a time. But often in our minds we replay hurts from the past or fast forward to imagined fears in the future.

I saw something recently that appears every few years written by Pauline Phillips and adapted from the original credo of Al-Anon. It is filled with practical wisdom to help us live the way we want to live and that God intends so that we can experience meaning, purpose, and joy in daily life.

Just for today, **I will live through this day only.** I will not brood about yesterday or obsess about tomorrow. I won't set far-reaching goals or try to overcome all of my problems at once. I know that I can do something for 24 hours that would overwhelm me if I had to keep it up for a lifetime.

Just for today, **I will be happy.** I will not dwell on thoughts that depress me. If my mind fills with clouds, I will chase them away and replace them with sunshine.

Just for today, **I will accept what is.** I will face reality. I will correct those things that I can correct and accept those I can't.

Just for today, **I will improve my mind.** I will read something that

requires thought and concentration. I won't be a mental loafer.

Just for today, **I will make a conscious effort to be agreeable.** I will be kind and courteous to those who cross my path, and I'll not speak ill of others. I'll improve my appearance, speak softly and not interrupt when someone else is talking. Just for today, I'll refrain from improving anybody but myself.

Just for today, **I will do something positive to improve my health.** If I'm a smoker, I'll quit. If I'm overweight, I'll eat healthfully -- if just for today. And not only that, I'll get off the couch and take a brisk walk, even if it's only around the block.

Just for today, **I will gather the courage to do what is right and take responsibility for my actions.**

These are things we can do daily. The secret is living one day at a time, not trying to live all year in one day. As we strive to be the people we want to be and God wants us to be, let us seek God's blessing as we live our lives one day at a time.

2010 Oberammergau Trip Informational Meetings

Informational meetings are scheduled for Sunday, February 22 at noon and Tuesday, March 17 at 7 p.m. for anyone interested in traveling to Germany with Gary Brand and Trinity friends for a June 2010 trip to see the Passion Play at Oberammergau. The Passion Play is presented only every 10 years and sells out very quickly. If you are interested, you will need to submit a \$300 deposit by March 31 (\$220 is refundable).

The Passion Play has been performed in Oberammergau, Austria for over 370 years. It was first performed when this thankful village promised God -- after the Black Plague had left their small village -- they would show their gratitude by putting on a Passion Play. And to ensure future generations would always remember, they vowed to do the play every decade. The play is a one-of-a-kind spectacular - a 6-hour musical and dramatic performance that every Christian should experience.

Total Base Cost: \$4,013.00 per person (based on double occupancy). This price includes: airfare from Columbus, Ohio, tour, transfers, taxes, tips, hotel, daily dinner and breakfast, and all tours indicated in the itinerary unless otherwise noted. Additional Options: \$298 ticket for the Passion play; \$299 trip insurance; \$88 for Neuschwanstein Castle tour.

We must have at least 2 adults (18 years old and up) in every classroom (which we have, for years, worked hard to accomplish), in every car that goes to events and at every activity we do. Trinity is blessed to have an amazing team of leaders in the youth ministry program, but the team can't do it all!

We are asking for the church's support in a few key ways. If you would be willing to be a substitute stand-in in Sunday School on any given Sunday (you would be called only when needed), we need you. If you would be willing to be an additional driver (or rider) for events, we need you. If you would be able to come on some Sunday evenings for special events, we need you.
